There are many types of planned gifts. If you can make a gift now, but need income for your retirement, you may also consider creating a Charitable Remainder Trust or Charitable Gift Annuity. Any of these options can provide you with important tax benefits.

Gifts of such lasting value are truly an expression of an individual's desire that the programs, institutions, and values most important to him or her will help to influence and guide future generations.

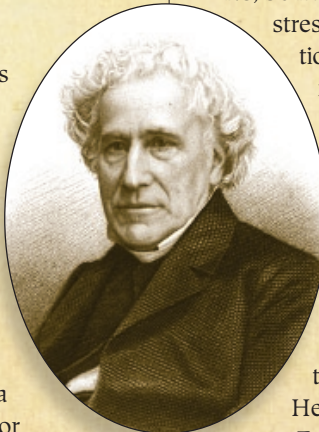
William Augustus Muhlenberg (1796-1877)

Widely regarded as the father of The Episcopal Church schools movement, William Augustus Muhlenberg founded the first 19th century Anglican school of Christian learning. The Flushing Institute, on New York's Long Island, was established in 1827 as a boarding school for boys where they would pursue general academics, be nurtured in an environment that stressed moral and spiritual education, while also receiving training for service in the Church.

Ten years after its founding, the school expanded to St. Paul's College. Muhlenberg's vision and influence quickly spread. In 1842 he participated in the establishment of Saint James Hall near Hagerstown, Maryland, later to become Saint James School.

He subsequently left his mark on Episcopal education, directly influencing many of our oldest Episcopal schools, including St. Paul's School in Concord, New Hampshire and Groton School in Groton, Massachusetts.

As NAES Executive Director, Daniel Heischman, observes, "Muhlenberg is as well known for the influence he had on subsequent generations of Episcopal school leaders as he is known for what he himself established. That makes him an ideal symbol and role model for our planned giving program, where we seek to highlight the enduring character of our commitment to Episcopal education, a commitment that lasts in influence beyond our own times."
